I have listed a variety of books that are available at the Madison Public Library, and I would like you to choose a book at your reading level.


ASSIGNMENT:

Deeply ashamed of his nation's leaders, fifteen-year-old Knud Pedersen resolved with his brother and a handful of schoolmates to take action against the Nazis if the adults would not.

THE DIARY OF A YOUNG GIRL by Anne Frank Anne Frank and her parents are forced into hiding when the Germans began invading her home land, Holland. They take refuge in a "Secret Annex". All the while, Anne keeps a diary of her thoughts and events that occur while in hiding during such dangerous times. Her account offers a fascinating commentary on human courage and frailty and a compelling self-portrait of a sensitive and spirited young woman whose promise was tragically cut short.

NUMBER THE STARS by Lois Lowry
Ten-year-old Annemarie Johansen and her best
friend Ellen Rosen often think of life before the war.
It's now 1943 and their life in Copenhagen is filled
with school, food shortages, and the Nazi soldiers
marching through town. When the Jews of
Denmark are "relocated," Ellen moves in with the
Johansens and pretends to be one of the family.
Soon Annemarie is asked to go on a dangerous
mission to save Ellen's life.

CODE TALKER by Joseph Bruchac
Ned Begay, a sixteen-year-old Navajo boy
becomes a code talker. Throughout World War II, in
the conflict fought against Japan, Navajo code
talkers were a crucial part of the U.S. efforts. They
sent messages back and forth in an unbreakable
code that used their native language.
